What is the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act, or CEJA?

Comprehensive energy legislation that centers equity and puts Illinois on track to achieve 100 percent renewable energy by 2050.

Equitable workforce & Support for business fossil fuel development and workers Electric Energy access transportation & solar for all Carbon-free Renewable energy power Energy efficiency



## **CEJA Funding**

- \$380M/yr investment in new renewable energy
- \$78M/yr in equitable workforce development
- \$41M/yr investment in former fossil fuel communities and workers
- \$4,000/electric vehicle rebate
- \$41M/yr to support beneficial electrification
- \$37M/yr for coal to solar and energy storage




### State agencies implementing CEJA

- DCEO: workforce programs, economic development programs, commissions & councils.
- Illinois Commerce Commission: Programs, initiatives & directors related to public utility programs
- Illinois EPA: Rebate and grant programs for electric vehicles and charging stations and overseeing the phase out of fossil fuel-fired electrical generation units.
- Illinois Power Agency: Illinois Shines (brand name for the Adjustable Block Program), Illinois Solar for All, Competitive procurements.




### Clean Energy Incubator (Section 5-45, pg 23)

### Program Criteria:

- 13 Program delivery Hub Sites
- Delivered by community-based organizations and their subcontractors
- Access to low-cost capital and financial support for small clean energy businesses.
- Support for business operations, such as obtaining permits and insurance
- Provide training and mentorships
- Provide recruitment and ongoing engagement with entities that hire contractors and subcontractors for renewable energy projects
- Connection to DOL
- Participant Criteria:
  - Owners of clean energy contractor businesses and nonprofits who reside EJ or R3 communities
  - Who reside in eligible communities. Preference shall be given to applicants who:
    - face barriers to employment; such as low educational attainment,
    - prior involvement with the criminal legal system,
    - language barriers;
    - graduates of or currently enrolled in the foster care system;
  - Displaced energy workers as defined by Energy Community Reinvestment








### Clean Energy Primes Accelerator (Section 5-55 pg 40

- Program Criteria:
  - 3 Program Delivery Areas: Northern, Central, Southern Illinois Program
  - Up to \$3M annually for each program
  - Mentor and support businesses and contractors through cohorts
  - Select a new cohort of participant contractors each Program Delivery Area every 18 months
  - Participants will receive five-year long one-on-one coaching to develop a five-year business plan
  - Operational support grants up to \$1m annually; operational support and mentorship help preparing bids; and much more.
  - Program will stand up a mentorship program, prime leads will recruit companies, provide a stipend, and making pairing with program participants.
  - substantial and demonstrated commitment of investing in and partnering with individuals and institutions in equity investment eligible communities.
  - Each regional cohort shall include between 3 and 5 participants.
  - The Program shall cap contractors in the energy efficiency sector at 50% of available cohort spots and 50% of available grants and loans, if possible
- Participant criteria:
  - 2+ years of experience in a clean energy or a related contracting field;
  - At least \$5,000 in annual business;





### **Equitable Energy Future Grant**

### **Section 5-60 pg 51**

#### **Program Criteria:**

 Seed funding and pre-development funding to equity eligible contractors to support energy efficiency (EE) and renewable energy (RE) projects.

#### Project Activities:

- · planning and project development,
- professional services: architecture, design, engineering, auditing, consulting, and developer services;
- project application, deposit, and approval;
- purchasing and leasing of land;
- permitting and zoning;
- interconnection application costs and fees, studies, and expenses;
- equipment and supplies;
- community outreach, marketing, and engagement;
- staff and operations expenses

#### **Applicant Criteria:**

- Equity Eligible Contractors: <u>Become an Equity Eligible Contractor Illinois Adjustable Block Program (illinoisabp.com)</u>, <u>Illinois Adjustable Block Program EEC Designee Application & Attestation (office.com)</u>
- Provide demonstrable proof of a historical or future, and persisting, long-term partnership with the community in which the project will be located





Community Solar Energy Sovereignty Grant

**Section 5-60 pg 51** 

#### Program Criteria:

- Support pre-development and development of community solar projects that promote community ownership and energy sovereignty
- ability and intent to create community ownership and other local community benefits, including local community wealth building via community renewable generation projects.

#### Project Activities:

- Pre-development work
- Development of programs and entities to assist in the long-term governance, management, and maintenance of community solar projects: such as community solar cooperatives.
- Early-stage project planning
- Project team organization
- Site identification;
- Organizing a project business model and securing financing
- Procurement and contracting;
- Customer outreach and enrollment; (vii) preliminary site assessments;
- Development of cooperative or community ownership model;
- Development of project models that allocate benefits to equity investment eligible communities.

#### **Applicant Criteria:**

- Include community-based organizations,
- Technical service providers working in direct partnership with community-based organizations





### **Elements of a Successful Team**

- Core technical elements of a grant program:
  - Physical space
  - Tools and supplies
  - Professional service partners (case managers, instructors, legal, accounting, etc.)
  - Ability to support certification acquisition and award credit (continuing ed or other)



# Tips for Team Building

- Use an asset-based approach
- Acknowledge your own capacity and capacity gaps
- Include partners in key decision making that's what makes them partners!
- Be clear about expectations and commit them to writing in an MOU

### National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Program


- Part of Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021 (IIJA)
- Formula program: \$148 million to IL over 5 years
- IDOT anticipating first round of funding availability in late 2023
- Additional \$2.5 billion USDOT discretionary program- Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI); first round closed in June 2023, next anticipated spring 2024


### **Carbon Reduction Program**

- Part of Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021 (IIJA)
- Formula program: \$6.4 billion total, approximately \$225 million to Illinois over 5 years
- Eligible projects: transportation projects that reduce carbon emissions
- Suballocated to metro areas based on population. Larger urban areas (Chicago, Rockford, Peoria, East St Louis, Quad Cities) will choose their own projects, IDOT will work with smaller cities to select projects in other parts of the state.
- Carbon Reduction Strategy under development- will be complete by November 2023



### Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ)

- ~\$210 million annually
- Must be used in Nonattainment Areas (see map to the right)
- Eligible projects: transportation projects that clean air or reduce use of Single Occupancy Vehicles
- Project selection happens annually in St. Louis and every other year in Chicago

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### **IPA** Resource

- <u>Equity Factsheet</u> -The equity factsheet was developed by the IPA after CEJA was passed. It CEJA equity targets and mandates for the clean energy industry.

- Equity Accountability System -CEJA created an equity accountability system mandating minimum equity standards for IPA administered programs and procurements. The Minimum Equity Standard went into effect on June 1, 2023 and will require that 10% of the work on renewable energy projects supported through certain IPA programs and procurements be performed by Equity Eligible Persons or contractors. That target will increase to 30% by 2030.
- How to be an Equity Eligible Contractor? -CEJA created new financing resources to support Equity Eligible
  Contractors participating in the Illinois Shines Program (statutorily known as Adjustable Block Program). An
  Equity Eligible Contractor can submit projects to the Illinois Shines in dedicated blocks of capacity reserved for
  Equity Eligible Contractors. These blocks provide an opportunity for Equity Eligible Contractors to receive
  advances on capital, which will help reduce barriers to participate in the Program.
- <u>Illinois Shines postcard</u> -Illinois Shines is the market-based solar incentive program implemented by the Illinois Power Agency.
- <u>Illinois solar for All postcard</u> -Illinois Solar for All is the income-eligible program implemented by the Illinois Power Agency.
