Todman Sworn in As Deputy Secretary

WASHINGTON—Today (June 14, 2021) was officially sworn in as the twelfth Deputy Secretary of Housing and Urban Development.

HUD Secretary Marcia L. Fudge issued the oath of office to Deputy Secretary Todman during a ceremony at HUD's headquarters that was livestreamed to the department's staff. Deputy Secretary Todman was confirmed by the Senate by unanimous consent on June 10.

Deputy Secretary Todman most recently served as the CEO of the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials (NAHRO). Before joining NAHRO in 2017, she served as the Executive Director of the District of Columbia Housing Authority (DCHA) and served in several career positions at HUD.

In video remarks, Deputy Secretary Todman stated: "I still remember the first trip I made to our nation's capital when I was a teenager. I felt inspired by the potential of the American government to help improve the lives of people in every corner of our country. I returned home to the U.S. Virgin Islands determined to devote my life to public since. Since that trip, I have spent my career working to expand opportunity for people—in the halls of Congress, at federal and local housing agencies, and as an advocate for organizations that advance affordable housing and community development.

Throughout my journey, I have made it my mission to help restore and revitalize our nation's public housing; to help build more affordable homes in our country; to help house people who are homeless and to help families achieve their dreams. At every step along the way, I have worked to safeguard the public's trust-and to deliver support to people in need with efficiency and with equity.

My name is Adrienne Todman-and I now have the great honor of serving as the Deputy Secretary of the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development. This will mark my second time serving at HUD-and I am thrilled to rejoin our amazing team and work alongside Secretary Fudge to build a strong, more secure, and more inclusive America.

Today, I am filled with the same sense of excitement, inspiration, and hope that I experienced during my first trip to Washington. And I can't wait to start working on behalf of the people and communities that HUD serves!

Industry Reacts to HUD Deputy Secretary Confirmation

MReport (Mortgage Banking News)—The United States Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs Thursday confirmed Adrienne Todman's appointment as Deputy Secretary of Housing and Urban Development. Todman is the first Black woman to serve as Deputy Secretary of HUD, and, according to a [Banking Committee announcement](#), she enjoys "broad bipartisan support." Committee Chair U.S. Sen. Sherrod Brown (D-OH) applauded the confirmations of Todman to HUD and also Nuria Fernandez' confirmation as Administrator of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA).

He said in a statement, "Congratulations to Deputy Secretary Todman and Administrator Fernandez on their confirmations. Both are distinguished public servants who understand the challenges we face, and will work to address the growing housing and transportation needs in cities, Indian country, and rural areas. I look forward to working with them to make equitable and sustainable infrastructure investments so we can build thriving communities."

David M. Dworkin President and CEO National Housing Conference (NHC) in March announced support for Todman, calling the former National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials (NAHRO) CEO the "perfect combination of experience to one of the nation's most important positions in housing. She understands the needs of HUD's primary constituencies, who are the housing and redevelopment officials throughout the country navigating HUD's programs and successfully maximizing the impact of its funding." He pointed to her previous experience at NAHRO and the District of Columbia Housing Authority where she gained "real-world knowledge of our housing challenges that is so essential to understanding the needs of the people and communities served by the Department."

A [press release from NAHRO](#) notes that "Todman was easily confirmed by a [unanimous voice vote](#)." Her former employer, NAHRO President Sunny Shaw, writes, "NAHRO's loss is our country's gain. We are grateful for the fearless and effective leadership she brought to NAHRO, and for the many ways in which she strengthened our association. We are thrilled to see such an experienced houser and proven leader, with such a deep understanding of affordable housing policy and practice, serve as Deputy Secretary at HUD, and we look forward to working with her in her new capacity." More support for the U.S. Virgin Islands native came from a number of housing advocates. The National Fair Housing Alliance, for example, Tweeted support, noting that "Todman has been instrumental in the fight for fair and affordable housing."

In an additional statement, NFHA President Lisa Rice said, "With a great leadership team in place at HUD, now is the time to take bold, meaningful actions. We look forward to working Secretary Fudge, Deputy Secretary Todman, and the Biden-Harris Administration as a whole to implement fair housing priorities to ensure everyone has access to decent, affordable housing in healthy, vibrant, well-resourced communities freedom from discrimination."

Ala.: Birmingham Housing Authority President Named Housing Association Leader (May 18)

David A. Northern, Sr., president of the Housing Authority of the Birmingham District, was sworn in Tuesday as president of the public Housing Authorities Directors Association. He previously served as senior vice president of the association and was nominated in January as president.

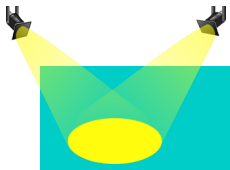
The Public Housing Authorities Directors Association represents about 2,000 public housing authorities across the country. “it’s exciting and such an honor to be chosen by my peers at PHADA as the incoming president,” Northern said.

The industry group works with legislators across the nation on policy development and to obtain funding for low-income public housing program.

During the virtual convention on Monday morning, outgoing President John A. Hodge, executive director of the Brunswick Housing Authority, congratulated Northern and said he looks forward to working with him. “He is an intelligent and dedicated housing professional and I know he will do an excellent job with serving in this capacity,” said Hodge.

“David Northern assumes the PHADA presidency at a challenging yet opportune time for the association and the affordable housing industry as a whole,” said Timothy G. Kaiser, executive director of the association. “David has been a long-time and valued PHADA committee member, Trustee and leader of the association, who has a deep background in public housing and other programs such as Moving to Work (MTW), non-profit housing, and the Renal Assistance Demonstration (RAD). David is well-respected for this experience and his commitment to, and advocacy on behalf of, our nation’s low-income residents.”

HABD Board of Commissioners Chair Anthony C. Hood also issued a statement: “On behalf of the Board of Commissioners, I would like to congratulate Mr. Northern on becoming the new president of PHADA. The Association has a dynamic reputation due to its advocacy for affordable housing improvements and regulations nationwide, and I’m thrilled that our very own President/CEO now serves in such a high-level role with the Association. I look forward to Mr. Northern being amongst the public housing policy makers in D.C. and taking his innovative ideas to Congress to improve the quality of life for residents of affordable housing.”

Lawmakers Asks USDA, HUD and FCC to Cooperatively Help Expand Internet Access!

Nextgov (June 7) - Almost two dozen senators called on the Federal Communications Commission, and Agriculture and Housing and Urban Development departments to improve how they share and use data to pinpoint U.S. communities without internet access. Led by Sen. Brian Schatz, D-Hawaii, the group of lawmakers—all Democrats—urged the agencies to better combine their resources and collectively confront the digital divide.

“The COVID-19 pandemic has made it even more apparent that affordable and reliable broadband is critical to accessing education, health care, and other essential services. Yet millions of households remain unconnected either because broadband infrastructure has not been built to their homes or the price of broadband services is out of reach for them,” the lawmakers wrote in a recent [letter](#) to the secretaries of USDA and HUD, and FCC’s chairwoman. “We need a collaborative, cross-government approach to addressing this gap.” FCC data suggests broadband [isn’t available](#) to at least 14 million people.

Specifically, the senators ask the entities to put more of their assets together to boost broadband, or high-speed internet connectivity—and to cooperatively promote more use of the existing federal phone and internet service program, [Lifeline](#). Both HUD and USDA “collect data that may be valuable in identifying neighborhoods where broadband is and is not available, or affordable for, low-income Americans,” the lawmakers note. They pointed to existing federally assisted housing and nutrition assistance data, and said the two should assess how it might be incorporated to complement the FCC’s [mandated](#) broadband mapping responsibilities.

“Accordingly, please identify data that your agencies collect that could guide resource allocation for expanding broadband connectivity in low-income communities,” they wrote. The departments could also help inform relevant, lower-income households who participate in their internal programs about the FCC’s Lifeline, which provides eligible subscribers with funding for phone and internet services. All three federal agencies could also simplify enrollment in that program, the senators suggested.

“As you work on these coordination efforts,” they wrote, “please identify any obstacles that you may face in sharing HUD and USDA data to increase broadband connectivity to the millions of unconnected low-income families residing in federally-assisted housing and participation in the Lifeline program.” The lawmakers did not provide a timeline for response.

Bigger Public Housing Set to Come to Pike County, Illinois

PITTSFIELD, ILL. (WGEM) -- There is money on the way to rehab public housing in Pike County, Illinois and Housing authority. Officials said the funds will help them give families more space, years ahead of schedule. Edna Harrison and her boyfriend have been living a one-bedroom apartment in Pittsfield, Illinois for five years. "It's a nice size until we have grandkids over to stay all night, but I think we live comfortable," Harrison said. But it's not comfortable for all the families that live in this housing complex.

Dani Crawford also lives in a one-bedroom unit out here with her fiancé and two-year-old daughter. "When they get bigger and we get more things, clothes, toys for her, anything, it dwindles down the room in a one-bedroom apartment especially if you got two or more people living in one. It is very difficult," Crawford said.

Pike County Housing Authority Executive Director Chris Bruns said they had plans to take the one-bedroom units and make them larger units in 2025. "At our sites in Pittsfield, we have 88 one-bedroom units, 10 two-bedroom units, nothing larger to meet the needs of the community," Bruns said. He said they received a little over \$464-thousand to take five buildings, 20 units and convert them over to two- to four-bedroom units. "We'll reduce from 20 apartments basically, to 7 because of the size differences, but we'll also be able to meet the needs of the town better."

Crawford says that as her daughter gets older, the space issue will only get harder. "The more they grow the smaller the place seems to be and when you have a lot of people trying to apply for these places, it's hard to get on a waiting list to get into a two bedroom which is where I'm having the problem," Crawford said.

Bruns said before they can see this plan in action, they have to review their annual and five-year plan, make modifications, get federal approval, and seek bids from contractors. He said he expects to see construction begin in about 6 months. He added that they will lose some units because of the work, but the people living in those units will be relocated to another public housing complex.

4 Tips for a Successful (and Safe) Splash Pad



Recreational water facilities—also known as splash parks, splash pads, spray grounds, wet decks, or spray parks—have gained popularity over the last decade. They're interactive, non-natural recreational areas where water is sprayed, splashed, or poured onto visitors. Water drains immediately out of the play area instead of accumulating. There's no doubt these recreational areas provide plenty of fun in the sun, but they also present unique hazards for residents and guests. Check out our tips below, and [get in touch with a member of the HAI Group Risk Control team](#) if you have any questions.

1. Check your state and local regulations—While laws vary by state and municipality, in most cases, recreational water facilities are considered a special use and require various approvals before, during, and after construction. [Take Ohio, for example](#)—design plans must be submitted to the state's health department before construction. The site must be approved and inspected during and after construction. Once the state signs off, local health department officials issue a license (if no problems are identified), allowing the facility to open. Again, this varies by state, so check with state and local officials before breaking ground. Bottom line: recreational water facilities should be restricted to areas constructed, operated, maintained, and supervised by organizations with the appropriate approvals and credentials.

2. Don't slack on maintenance—Given the presence of water, recreational water facilities have the potential for contamination and the spread of recreational water illnesses (RWIs), which are caused by germs and chemicals found in the water we swim in, [according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention \(CDC\)](#). RWIs are spread by swallowing, breathing in mists or aerosols, or having contact with contaminated water in swimming pools, hot tubs, waterparks, water play areas, interactive fountains, lakes, rivers, or oceans.

- Maintain the water chemistry in a manner that prevents the potential for the spread of RWIs.
- For recirculated water systems, check chlorine levels several times a day, backwash filters regularly, and verify circulation and turnover rates are in compliance with health codes. Clean play areas to maintain traction and help prevent slip and fall injuries. Disinfect with bleach on a regular basis; make sure to wipe down water features. If the play area is unguarded or unfenced, look out for pets, debris, and other items that may enter the area.
- In the case of contamination, drain the play area and recirculation system. Perform multiple cleaning cycles—bacterial strains [such as E. coli](#) are extremely resistant. Disinfect the entire play area and any equipment according to the [CDC's "Fecal Incident Response Recommendations for Pool Staff"](#) and ensure proper operation of the play area before reopening.
- Post monitoring and maintenance procedures for the maintenance staff. This may include when and how to test the water, any corrective actions taken due to unsanitary conditions and a cleaning schedule for the holding tanks and play area.
- Maintain the recreational water facility in a clean and sanitary state.
- Respond appropriately to adverse incidents that may affect the health of users.
- Enclose or fence part or all of the recreational water facility to prohibit unauthorized access and help prevent wandering children from escaping the area.
- Be equipped with appropriate safety and emergency equipment to respond to the hazards associated with the use of the facility. This may include first-aid supplies, an emergency telephone, drinking/bottled water, and blankets.
- Maintain procedures and train facility staff in responding to emergency incidents, including water pollution.

3. Perform daily pre-opening and closing inspections—Maintain a log and keep records of your daily checks.

- Add fresh water, filter, and disinfect water daily.
- Report accidents, incidents, and emergencies.
- Record breakdown of equipment and repairs.
- Check that all grating and drain covers are securely fastened to all pipelines and fittings that terminate in the play area.
- Ensure the play area is clean and free from obstacles such as broken bottles, garbage, rocks, bird feces, grass cuttings, etc.
- Clear all surfaces of any mold, moss, or algae as this can cause a slipper surface.
- Ensure water chemistry is adequate and treatment and recirculation equipment is operational and maintained.
- Install and test ground fault interrupters where necessary.

4. **Create safety rules**—Develop and post rules to provide clear expectations and guidelines on the proper use of your facility. Posted rules are also easier to enforce. The following are suggested rules to include along with any custom rules:

- Require that children be supervised at all times.
- Prohibit running, tripping, or rough play.
- Post signs with safety rules and regulations in the play area. Rules should clearly identify the hours of operation, designated age groups, supervision requirements, and general safety considerations specific to your agency.
- Refrain residents and guests from using the play area if they have an open sore or rash or are experiencing nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea.
- Prohibit the use of the play area during an electrical storm or when thunder can be heard, even if it is not raining. It does not have to be raining for lightning to strike.
- Clear the area when conditions for thunder or lightning are possible.
- Require swim diapers for children under four years old.
- Ask residents and guests to use a chemical-free sunscreen and re-apply often.
- Ask residents and guests to wash hands after using the toilet or changing diapers.
- Prohibit the swallowing of water from the play area, as it is not intended for drinking.
- Prohibit the use of glass containers, food, and beverages in and around the play area.
- Prohibit animals and pet access in the play area.
- Prevent pollution of water in and around the play area.
